

About the film

LOOK! I'M IN COLLEGE!, the winner of the 2010 Paul Robeson Award for Best Short Documentary at the Newark Black Film Festival, follows four New York City teenagers during an extraordinary time in their lives. As young boys, Terence, Benny, Donald, and Rayquan were diagnosed with autism. Faced with low expectations and the exceptional learning challenges of having a development disorder, all four young men matriculated through New York City's public schools. With the aid of dedicated public school teachers, and the progressive vision of a university, what followed was a trial inclusion program at Pace University. The four young men become the charter members of one of the country's first college-based Inclusion programs. Proving that the impossible was possible, Terence, Benny, Donald, and Rayquan attended classes, made presentations to fellow students, took part in social activities, and proudly carried their college IDs. Today all four students are employed at full-time jobs!
